## From the Rector's Desk:

### The Journey Inward, the Journey Outward and the Journey Together

I have a very disappointing tomato plant living on my porch. For all intents and purposes, it looks healthy and happy, but it is without a doubt a colossal disappointment. This mediocre specimen began its life sometime in February as a grade school science project of our then fourth grader. Home it came one dark and dismal afternoon, and we knew right away that it would more than likely die under the black thumbs of our horticulturally challenged household.

But that did not stop me! Oh no! Off to Home Depot I drove with visions of grow lights and winter tomatoes in my head. I imagined the dreary households of neighbors suffering through midwinter porridge, hard tack and root vegetables while we enjoyed the succulent glory of juicy life-giving tomatoes. Scurvy for the lot of them and healthy produce for the Dangelo's!

So, I planted the seedlings in fresh soil, placed them under a grow light, and I waited. And, I waited and I waited. Yellow flowers burst into being only to wilt and die. The plant grew and grew, but the lovely saffron blossoms never became the delicious fruit I desired. And now, on the back porch my plant sits bloom free and tomato-less; a disappointment indeed. The soil was good, the water was sufficient, but I know I missed something along the way.

I cannot help but find in my tomato-free tomato plant a parable of the Christian life. Our souls require tending, and this fall I hope you will consider three journeys as you consider how you will care for your seedling soul during the seasons ahead. Our fall stewardship theme is The Journey Inward, the Journey Outward and the Journey Together. The soul requires each of these three journeys to become a truly fruitful one. The Journey Inward refers to the life of prayer and worship, particularly at the Redeemer, but also in the midst of our daily living. The Journey Outward refers to the essential movement of our prayer and worship into serving the needs of our neighbors. And the Journey Together, arguably the most difficult, refers to how we live together as a parish community dedicated to the first two journeys. Without the three journeys providing our souls with the proper admixture of nutrients, water and sunlight we will find after a certain time that we are not quite the most productive souls we could be. When we are hoping for fruit, all we will find is foliage.

As you look to the return of regularly scheduled things of work, school, kids, grandkids and all of the rest, I hope you will consider your soul and its care. The Redeemer offers a wonderful array of opportunities to

nourish your journey inward, outward and together. Your soul matters to God, it matters to your family, and it matters to the world in which you live. You and I were created to bear fruit to bless the world, but unless we take the time to nourish our souls in all three ways they will never bear the fruit God dreams for us. Consider setting out on these three journeys, and be amazed by the life God grows.

The summer is quickly coming to an end and we will soon begin to settle into our new fall routines. Our children will return to school, the temperatures will start to get cooler, the leaves will begin to change colors, the Red Sox will make another World Series run and Stewardship Season at the Redeemer will begin. Our lives will get busier and busier, but our daily and weekly routines will bring comfort to us as we try to get everything done.

As the new Stewardship Co-Chairs, we are asking you to consider changing your routine a little or at least adding one more item to the list. We want you to save some space in the calendar to spend some time with God. Whether this is more consistently attending church services, reading the Bible or spending more time in prayer, we would encourage you to work on your relationship with God.

Our stewardship season will officially kick off on Sunday, September 30<sup>th</sup>. Prior to then, the Stewardship Co-Chairs will reach out to our incredible team of Shepherds. Our Stewardship Shepherds are the heart of our annual Stewardship campaigns as they tirelessly reach out to parishioners to make sure everyone has a chance to take part. If you are invited to be a Shepherd this year, we strongly encourage you to participate to ensure that we have a successful Annual Campaign. Stewardship training sessions for Shepherds will be held on **Sunday, September 16th** and **Sunday, September 23rd at 9:15am** (details to follow).

Last year more than 219 families pledged over \$840,000 toward our life of worship, education, fellowship and outreach. Thank you for your generosity! Our 2019 Annual Campaign goal is *\$850,000 from 225 individuals and families*. As we approach stewardship season, please begin to prayerfully consider making a generous gift to the Annual Campaign. Your pledges fund the salaries and benefits of all parish staff, program expenses for Christian formation, education, fellowship, and outreach, and so much more.

## From the Priest for Children, Youth and Family Ministries

### Details Matter

Near the end of each Godly Play lesson, there are two questions the teacher asks: I wonder which part of the story is the most important? and I wonder which part of this story we could do without, and still have all the story we need? I have discovered over the last six years that these questions are the most likely to make the adult teachers uncomfortable. Although the principle is to allow students to give any answer during lessons, this is the part where that principle seems mysteriously to disappear--suddenly we are in the world of Big Concepts and Overarching Arguments where only the adult has the right answer. Adults often want to focus on what they have understood to be necessary and important.

Young children, on the other hand, tend to zero in on the details. "We only need the rock where Moses went up!" or "The most important is where Sarah dies." Often, the class will produce a variety of details, and the teacher can watch a kind of kaleidoscope story unfolding--what once was a simple storyline has been refracted through a variety of gazes, each centered in a particular detail, perhaps even one that escaped others' notice.

Details are very important. They are important in our faith, in how we read our Scriptures, and in our relationships with one another.

In Bible Study discussions, it's a difference of two letters that transforms "Israeli" into "Israelite," but what a transformation! It's a difference of pronunciation of two letters that makes "Jorge" into "George," but lost from one to the other is a language, a history, and a heritage. It may seem like an unimportant detail to remember that I grew up in Colorado or that my boyfriend was born in Rome, but these details are two of the foundational points of our lives.

One thing our children (and teachers!) are learning when we ask Which part of the story is the most important? and Which part of the story can we leave out? is to attend to how others see the story. That details they may not care about are incredibly significant to someone else. It's good to pay attention to the details that other people find important. That's part of how we care for others. I'm so glad that our students (and teachers!) are learning this on Sundays, and I hope our whole community is learning it as we grow together in Christ's love.

If I can break for a moment for some other news--I'm happy to share with you all that in July my boyfriend and I became engaged to be married. His name is Omar De Paolis, and many of you know him already. He leads our High School Youth Group with me, and once a month he leaves his own parish of St. Columbkille's for our Evensong service, which he loves. When he's not helping me with sermons or unsuccessfully correcting my Italian pronunciation (proud Roman that he is), he is a research chemist working on new syntheses of therapeutics. We expect to be married in the fall of 2019, and I look forward to introducing him to more of you in the coming months.

Dear Fellow Parishioners,

This summer at the Redeemer has been a time of quiet reflection and welcome restoration. The enervating, hot days of July and August were balanced by the coolness of the sanctuary, the joyful sounds of the summer choir and the Schoenstein organ and lemonade in the shade of the Rectory garden. Much needed vacation time was taken by our clergy and staff. Some changes and repairs have been made around the Parish campus, including new pavement in the parking lot, repair to the Old Parish Hall roof and stonework on the church, and fresh coats of paint in the Parish Hall. The end of the summer was celebrated in August by the Parish with a family picnic and cookout at the Rectory.

The FUEL Program had an excellent, productive summer, with Velura Perry’s able leadership and many Redeemer volunteers providing 700 backpacks and 7000 pounds of food for families of Newton School children in need.

In September, Blue Kangaroo, LLC , an early development program for children six months to three years of age, is planning to move into the Weld Parish House space, recently vacated by the cooperative nursery school. Blue Kangaroo will be conducting its children’s program on weekdays from 9 to 12 from September through July.

As is custom, the Vestry did not meet over the summer. The monthly Vestry meetings will resume in September, with dinners for Vestry members this month, as well as a retreat for Vestry members on Saturday, October 13th at the Bethany House of Prayer.

The program year for the Redeemer starts in September. As described elsewhere, Pastor Emily and the Church School Committee have great plans for our children in the church school this year, including a new program for fifth, sixth and seventh graders. Our full choir has returned, accompanied by Michael Murray on our ever more beautiful Schoenstein organ. Adult Education will include Jack Goldsmith and Barbara Kennard leading discussions again this year. Some lively fellowship events are on the calendar for the fall. For those looking for even more involvement in Parish life, The Altar Guild, Church Service League and Christmas Market, Mission and Outreach and Project FUEL offer many volunteer opportunities, a chance to help others and to get to know your fellow parishioners better.

We have so much to be thankful for at the Church of the Redeemer. We look forward to seeing you here.

This is going to be an exciting year at that Redeemer! Our new organ will be put through her paces, and the glorious soundscape she provides opens new and exciting avenues for us to try.

**The Choristers** will soon resume their rehearsals. In addition to their usual schedule of services, they will also participate in one of the organ dedication concerts. If you have a child who loves to sing, and over the age of 8, please let me know - we have an awful lot of fun, and learn a lot too! The Choristers meet most Tuesday afternoons during the season.

We will also be offering a new opportunity for our younger children to raise their voices in the Fall. This **“Musical Moment”**, headed by Janet Ross and Kathy Zinger, will be a short conclusion to the Sunday School morning in the church, where the little ones can begin to find their voices, learning some well known hymns, as well as some vocal technique. This programmatic element will be incorporated into the Sunday School curriculum, so no sign-up is necessary.

**The Parish Choir** resumes its usual duties on September 9th. If you, or someone you know, loves to sing give me a call - I'd love to hear from you. The Parish Choir rehearses almost exclusively on Sunday mornings.

In October, there will be four events to celebrate our new organ. Each is designed to show the organ off in a different role.

### Friday - October 19th at 7:30PM Concert - “Fancies & Bonbons”

In addition to some rousing corporate music making, the Choristers & Choir will sing favorites of the Anglican tradition. Our own oboist, Keisuke Wakao, and soprano Hailey Fuqua will also perform solo works. In addition, Stuart Forster and I will both play a popular solo piece to show off the organ's playful side, followed by a fun and festive reception in the Narthex. This is a short concert of fun, tuneful “Chart Toppers”!

### Sunday - October 21st at 5:00PM Dedicatory Evensong

Professor Thomas Murray of Yale University will join us to enhance this already spectacular Evensong. Tom is one of the living legends of the organ world. His delicious playing has been lauded all over the globe. He will play an extended Prelude to the Evensong (this Prelude will begin at 5:00PM), as well as the closing Voluntary. Stuart Forster will do his usual masterful accompanying of the choir, as they sing repertoire previously unheard at the Redeemer, including a ‘lost’ work by Martin Shaw, which is most likely an American debut. This herculean Evensong, and the festive reception in the Undercroft, is not to be missed!

### Friday - October 26th at 7:30PM Inaugural Recital

Ken Cowan is a master of the instrument and one of the most sought after organists. Internationally renowned for his dazzling technique, Ken is sure to wow us, extracting every possible color from the organ. His programme will include both organ music and quite a few orchestral transcriptions, including Wagner's famous “Ride of the Valkyries”! More festivities in the Undercroft follow!

### Saturday - October 27th at 3:00PM Organ Demonstration - “Conversations with Jack Bethards”

Jack Bethards, President and Tonal Director of Schoenstein & Co., will offer an informal discussion of the organ's design and operation, with yours-truly at the organ console. This is a unique opportunity to learn about the organ's construction and the fascinating intricacies of the instrument.
